FISCAL NOTE

House Bill 283 as passed the House of Representatives will increase by an insignificant amount the administrative obligations of the Department of Public Safety as a result of its additional duties related to the issuance of initial driver's licenses, or learner's license, a driver's license issued after an examination, or initial nondriver identification cards. Conversely, the administrative obligations of the judge of probate offices would decrease.

All fees remain the same including the \$1.50 fee that goes to the county, except that currently in counties (Marion and Winston) in which the judge of probate is compensated by fees, 40% of each \$1.50 is retained by the judge and the remaining 60% is paid into the public highway and traffic fund of the county. In counties in which the judge is not compensated by fees, the entire amount (\$1.50) is paid into the public highway and traffic fund of the county. As amended, the \$1.50 would be remitted to the county general fund rather than the public highway and traffic fund of the county and in Madison and Winston Counties, the judge of probate (fund). This bill will not otherwise affect state or local funding.

House Bill 673 as introduced creates a system to determine the age at which a student can apply for a learner's permit, motor driven cycle operator's license, or driver's license based upon disciplinary actions taken by schools against students over the age of 12 years. The bill will increase the costs of local boards of education by an undetermined amount depending on the system of records to be created and maintained and the reporting requirements to the Department of Public Safety.

The bill provides that the Department of Public Safety hear student contests and that students may further appeal to district court. The bill will increase the obligations of the Department of Public Safety by an amount depending on the records requirements adopted by the Department and the number of hearings and appeals.

The bill could increase the receipts and obligations of the district courts for appeals of Department of Public Safety hearings.
